

Hi everyone

I was thrilled to return to my CEO role in January this year, having enjoyed parental leave and adjusted to life as a first-time mother to my beautiful daughter Charlotte. I returned to the role with a renewed vigour, energy and enhanced commitment to ensuring children globally receive equal access to education. Becoming a mother has taught me so many new things but above all, I know that every parent desires the very best for their child - in health, wellbeing, education and opportunity. Parenthood is the universal leveller and it has made me even more determined to provide vulnerable children the same opportunities my own daughter will have by nature of being born into a country like Australia.

I would like to extend my sincere thanks to Helen Caldwell for her service as Acting CEO during my parental leave. Helen coached and led the team with great humility and strength and we were extremely grateful to have her over the past 12 months. I would also like to thank Adrienne Revai, our Chair, for her leadership, oversight and support during this time. We are also farewelling Steve Burcher and Zoe Robinson from our Board of Directors, both of whom have made huge contributions to School for Life's growth and progress over the years. Thank you both for your service.

School for Life achieved wonderful results this year, thanks to the support of you, our generous and loyal supporters. You are creating future generations of educated, empowered and energised young people who are able to achieve their full potential through education. Some of our year's highlights include creating a 'hub and spoke' model to extend our impact in partnership with 2 local Government primary schools to provide 770 students and 18 teachers with quality education programs which include teacher training, provision of clean water sources, infrastructure, nutritious meals and menstrual hygiene support, introducing a robust skilling program for all 1700 students in School for Life's schools to ensure they are modern workforce ready and providing more than 500 high school students with a safe space to grow and thrive in our boarding facilities.

I returned to Uganda for the first time in 3 years in March 2023 and was at the girls' boarding house after school talking to our head prefect Lyn. She only joined School for Life a few years ago but I sat down with her and asked her what her ambitions were and her answer stopped me in my tracks. She said, with incredible conviction, 'I know what I want to do with my life. I am going to build a school like School for Life so that other

children like me can have the same opportunity I've been given.' And then she said, 'and I won't let you down.'

That moment was life-changing for me. It all hit me in one moment that if Lyn went on to deliver on her promise, thousands more lives would be impacted, and Lyn is just one of the 1700 students whose lives are being transformed by School for Life... Just imagine what the other 1699 will create and just think of the ripple effect you're creating with your generosity.

Where We Work

UGANDA

- Uganda is a landlocked country, smaller in size than the Australian state of Victoria. It is bordered by South Sudan, Kenya, Tanzania, Rwanda and the Democratic Republic of Congo.
- School for Life schools are located in Mpigi. This area was identified by the Ugandan Ministry of Education as most in need in Uganda and was chosen by School for Life to help as many children and adults as possible who previously had little access to education.

POPULATION OF 48 MILLION, WITH 45% UNDER 14

- Uganda's population of 48.5 million increases by about 3% each year, with 71% of people living in rural areas.
- Life expectancy is approx. 64 years with 2% of the population older than 65.
- Uganda has a high fertility rate an average of 4.4 children born per woman.
- Uganda has one of the world's youngest median ages at 16.3 years about 45% of the population is under 14, which places great pressure on the demand for education.

DESPITE SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS, UGANDA REMAINS ONE OF THE POOREST COUNTRIES IN THE WORLD

- Children still face multiple barriers to accessing education, leaving them trapped in a cycle of poverty and COVID-19 has exacerbated existing inequalities.
- 60% of Ugandans have a daily wage of AUD\$2.75 and it costs on average 50 cents to feed a child three meals a day.
- Uganda's inflation rate jumped by 5% this year, significantly impacting the cost of living adding additional pressure on families and increasing risks of child labour.

1 IN 3 CHILDREN DO NOT COMPLETE PRIMARY SCHOOL

• For girls, the outlook is even more challenging, with 4 in 5 girls who enroll in primary school not progressing to high school.

STUDENT WELLBEING


The impact of school closures has meant a greater focus on student wellbeing than ever before. Programs and services pivoted to meet the emerging needs of students and their communities.

School for Life's Community and Welfare Team continue to implement a diverse range of activities to support the wellbeing of students and the wider community.






Quality Education

- Educated 1,672 students, aged from three to 18 years old, across three schools, and supported the education of 756 students in two local government schools.
- 100% (79) of School for Life Primary 7 students passed their Primary Leaving Exams in December 2023 enabling them to transition onto High School.
- Maintained a 50:50 ratio of girls to boys.
- Maintained a 30:1 student to teacher ratio.
- Hired nine new teachers, bringing our teaching staff to 74.
- Established a brand new computer lab at Katuuso Primary School to assist our teachers and students with IT skills.
- Students across all three schools participate in weekly skills training chosen by the students and led by SAWA World, including baking, crochet, graphic design, crafts and agriculture. A very successful Exhibition Day was held in May 2023 to enable students to showcase and sell their products to the broader community and 98% of their products were sold.
- Each of our campuses hosted their very own Sports Day, where students spent the day showing off their sporting talents and enjoying a well-deserved break from their classes.
- 45 pupils from School for Life's two primary schools qualified to participate in national level football and netball competitions. The students traveled to the Ugandan city of Masaka to compete in the national football and netball competitions, in which all 136 districts of Uganda were represented.
- 15 School for Life students qualified for the national athletics competition and in an incredible effort, student Janepher placed third in the 800m event at the national competition.
- Extracurricular school clubs included Writers' club, Reading club, Friends of the Environment, Music, Dance and Drama, Debating, Scouts and the Duke of Edinburgh's Award scheme.
- Our first group of Senior 4 students took their Uganda Certificate of Education exams (equivalent to Year 10 completion certificate) in October 2022.
- A grant from 100 Women supported a class of 50 girls graduating from Primary School to their first year of secondary school in 2023.
- Fundi Bots continued to support the schools with science equipment aimed at simplifying the teaching and learning of science subjects.



Student Wellbeing

- The Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) Program, supported by the Phillips Foundation, delivered 2000 menstrual hygiene kits to our students and local communities.
- Senior girls participated in an 8-week mentorship program to develop self-esteem and independence through development of financial management, decision making and goal setting skills.
- Provided ongoing counselling and one-on-one support to help children stay in school.
- Senior boys attended life planning sessions on how to manage social, emotional and physical changes that happen during adolescence.
- Three health clinics staffed by qualified nurses provided vital care with the main issues being respiratory illnesses, gastro and malaria. Treatment for these conditions is not affordable for most parents so this service is of great benefit.
- Pre-school students at Katuuso and Mbazzi Primary Schools received deworming vaccinations as well as Vitamin A which has a range of benefits including improved vision, immunity and growth and development.
- Senior 4 students enjoyed attending the first ever prom held at Mbazzi Secondary School by dressing up for the event, dancing, dining together and taking lots of photos.
- In October 2022 the schools celebrated Uganda's Independence Day the first one since the COVID shutdown with face painting, dancing and singing the national anthem.
- Mass health screenings for returning students, checking for malaria, typhoid, sexual health and dental hygiene.
- Outreach programs provided vaccines for girls for human papillomavirus and deworming treatments.
- Crops of maize, sweet potato, matooke, cabbages and collard greens were grown and harvested across the three school sites, providing staff and students with nutritious meals.
- Walkways were installed at Katuuso Primary to improve safety and access.
- Construction commenced on an all weather multi-purpose hall at Mbazzi Secondary school to provide a space for the 600 boarders to eat meals, hold assemblies and collaborate together.
- 1,555 students and staff received Dental Health Services.
- Health education talks were given throughout the year, covering topics such as personal hygiene, sexual health, malaria prevention and ebola disease response.



Capacity Building

- Teachers from each school attended a three-day workshop to improve their computer literacy skills to assist with lesson planning, development of digital resources and exam creation.
- With the support of the Uganda Management Institute, all Department Heads in our three campuses took part in leadership training and development as well as receiving one-to-one coaching.
- 74 teachers across the three campuses participated in Instructional Planning training to assist with continual improvement of our student achievement and learning outcomes.
- In March 2023 we celebrated International Women's Day in Australia and Uganda with the theme of 'Cracking the Code; Innovation for a gender equal future'.
- Continued progress made on developing our Monitoring and Evaluation expertise and capacity.
- We started piloting a Government Schools 'hub and spoke' partnership program with two local schools in Mpigi District. The goal is to provide hundreds more children with the support they need to access a quality education and includes implementing a nutrition program, access to clean water, sanitation and hygiene, improving infrastructure, skills training and supporting teachers' capacity development. This pilot will lay the groundwork to expand into more communities and support more children.
- 24 members of the School Leadership Team were supported with coaching and mentorship from the Uganda Management Institute.



Community Engagement

- In partnership with Alive Medical Services, we conducted community outreach clinics at Katuuso and Mbazzi. Over 100 community members attended and were tested and treated for malaria, typhoid, blood sugar levels, high blood pressure, cervical and breast cancer, hepatitis B, HIV and family planning.
- Students, teachers and parents across our campuses participated in a community cleaning day 'Go Green Day' to support the local environment.
- Continued to provide free, clean drinking water to over 5000 community members.
- WASH hand washing programs for students and the communities to improve hygiene and reduce illness.
- Distributed MHM kits and conducted MHM workshops for students and hundreds of girls in surrounding communities. These workshops countered myths and misconceptions about menstruation that keep girls home from school.
- More than 300 people across seven villages attended Gender Based Violence workshops which provided information on gender based violence and its impact on children.
- Employed 7 local women at Kumi to make school uniforms and reusable sanitary items. They also ran training sessions with students, and attended workshops to learn how to make new garments.
- Thanks to Sew Aid, our Kumi tailors received brand new sewing machines to replace ones no longer fit for purpose which will improve quality and productivity.

Hannah was introduced to soap making skills through Sawa World, one of our skilling partners. This ignited her passion for soap making. She has since brought the skill home convincing her parents to invest in her business. Today, Hannah produces liquid and bar soap for sale, managing her business, saving profits, and reinvesting earnings to sustain production. After school Hannah dreams of becoming a doctor.



Josephine

Josephine is 15 years old and is in Primary 6 at one of the local Government schools. She is grateful to School for Life for providing her a menstrual pack. She says "You have saved me from using tattered rags that have been very uncomfortable. With this beautiful menstrual pack that you have given me, I will not miss school anymore and I am sure I will be confident and happy again."

Our menstrual hygiene management program has been very successful in supporting girls, learning how to make and use reusable sanitary kits, overcoming barriers girls face when menstruating and battling common misconceptions.

Janifer

Janifer is 12 years old and in Primary 4 at Katuuso Primary School. She is on a sports scholarship and plays for the under-14 team in football and athletics. She tells us she loves scoring goals, defending and winning races.

Our students are not only receiving a quality education but are actively participating in a range of sports programs including soccer, netball, volleyball and athletics. This year, for the first time, four of our students made it through to the national athletics competition and were awarded sports scholarships for their efforts. They participated in running, high jump and hurdles. Most recently 45 primary school students participated in the national ball sports competition and we are proud to share that 28 of the 45 students representing School for Life were girls.

FINANCIALS

Financial Performance

School for Life enjoyed another strong year in FY2023, recording total revenue of \$4.8 million and a net surplus of almost \$1.1 million. This represents an astounding 22.9% increase in total revenue from last year, a testament to the unwavering support and generosity of our donors and supporters. Core fundraising income increased by 23.3%, representing back to back record years for School for Life.

INCOME

A record year of core fundraising income, highlighted by significant contributions from:


- A fantastic Gala Ball, hosted by Hamish Blake, raised almost \$1.9 million to support the ongoing education of 1,700+ students. This represents a remarkable 59.6% growth from FY2022.
- Ongoing support of our loyal major donors, who contributed over \$1.3 million in major gifts.
- Our amazing child sponsors and regular givers, whose support raised approximately \$700k in revenue during the year.
- Investment income of \$97k reflected a significant increase in the size of School for Life's corpus and an improvement in rates of investment return.

EXPENSES


Total expenditure in FY2023 increased by 35%, primarily driven by increased payments to international programs. Notable line items include:

- Funds to international programs increased by 57%, reflecting the growth in Ugandan operations. In particular, SFL Uganda piloted a partnership with an additional 2 Government-run primary schools in 2023, which extended School for Life's reach to a further 770 students.
- Accountability and administration costs increased 45%, largely due to the scaling up of operations and external contractor expenses.
- All other expense categories increased by approximately 11%, in line with the growth in income and general operating levels.

The directors present their report on School for Life Foundation Australia Limited (the "company") for the year ended 30 June 2023.

Principal activities

During the year, the principal activities of the company were fundraising activities associated with the funding of School for Life's operations in Uganda, carried out by School for Life Foundation Limited ("SFL Uganda"). Through SFL Uganda, the company provides education, healthcare, community outreach and vocational training services to the students and communities of Mpigi district in Uganda. SFL Uganda operates two primary schools and one boarding high school in Mpigi, Uganda, educating over 1,700 students and employing more than 110 Ugandans in its operations. In 2023, it piloted a partnership with an additional 2 Government-run primary schools to implement its proven quality education model, providing teacher training, nutritious meals, WASH programs, infrastructure and outreach activities to an additional 770 students.

There was no significant change in the nature of the activities of the company during the year.

Review of operations

The company recorded a net surplus of \$1,057,410 for the year ended 30 June 2023, a decrease of 9% from the net surplus recorded in FY2022 (\$1,159,799). FY2023 total revenue of \$4,799,756 represented a 23% increase on FY2022 (\$3,904,572), largely reflecting an increase in major gifts and donations, particularly in relation to the FY2023 Gala Ball event. Key fundraising highlights from the year included:

· A record result from our annual Gala Ball held at The Star.

FY2023 total expenditure of \$3,742,346 represented a 36% increase on FY2022 (\$2,744,773), largely driven by an increase in funds sent to Uganda due to higher levels of capital expenditure in FY2023 compared to the prior year.

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1 Summary of significant accounting policies

This note provides a list of all significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated. The financial statements are for School for Life Foundation Australia Limited as an individual entity.

School for Life Foundation Australia Limited

Notes to the financial statements

30 June 2023 (continued)

(a) Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board, the *Corporations Act 2001* and the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*. School for Life Foundation Australia Limited is a not-for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

(i) Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosure Requirements

The financial statements of the company comply with Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures as issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB).

(ii) Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, unless otherwise stated.

(iii) Comparatives

Where necessary, comparative information has been reclassified and repositioned for consistency with current year disclosures.

(iv) New and amended standards adopted by the company

The company has applied the following standards and amendments for the first time in their annual reporting period commencing 1 July 2022:

 AASB 2020-3 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards - Annual Improvements 2018-2020 and Other Amendments [AASB 1, AASB 3, AASB 9, AASB 116, AASB 137 & AASB 141].

The amendments listed above did not have any impact on the amounts recognised in prior periods and are not expected to significantly affect the current or future periods.

(b) Foreign currency translation

(i) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates ('the functional currency').

(ii) Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at year end exchange rates are generally recognised in profit or loss.

All foreign exchange gains and losses are presented in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income on a net basis within other gains/(losses).

1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(c) Revenue recognition

Upon the receipt of revenue, it is first determined whether the transaction is a contract with a customer under AASB 15, i.e. is there an enforceable contract and are there sufficiently specific performance obligations to be met. If the conditions of AASB 15 are met, then the revenue is capitalised until the contract is completed and then recognised as revenue in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income. If either of these criteria are not satisfied, then revenue is recognised under AASB 1058.

Revenues under AASB 1058 are recognised as revenue received in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the company gains control, economic benefits are probable and the amount received can be measured reliably. Revenue is recognised at the time of received or receivable.

Revenue is recognised for the major activities using the methods outlined below.

(i) Sponsorships and regular giving

Revenues through Child Sponsorship, Teacher Sponsorship and Regular Giving of a nominated amount, are unconditional transfers of cash recognised in the period received. These may be monthly, quarterly or annual payments. This revenue is recognised at the time of receipt.

(ii) Donations and major gifts

Donations and major gifts are recognised as revenue received in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the company gains control, economic benefits are probable and the amount received can be measured reliably. This revenue is recognised at the time of receipt.

(iii) Giving day

Receipts from Giving day are recognised as revenue received in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the company gains control, economic benefits are probable and the amount received can be measured reliably. This revenue is recognised at the time of receipt.

(iv) Gala ball

The School for Life Foundation Australia Limited Annual Gala Ball is a major fundraiser that incorporates a Live Auction, Silent Auction and Raffles to raise unconditional revenue. Partnerships and tickets are also sources of revenue for the event. All revenue is recognised at the time of receipt.

(v) Grants

Grants are assessed to determine if they are subject to treatment under standard AASB 15 or AASB 1058. Under AASB 1058 the grant is further assessed to determine if a Termination for Convenience clause is included, if so then the grant is initially recorded as a liability in the statement of financial position.

(vi) Donations-in-kind

Goods and services donated are included at their fair value to the company where this can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost. These goods are subsequently used in activities such as being auctioned at our Gala ball fundraiser or as raffle prizes. This revenue is recognised at the time of receipt.

(c) Revenue recognition (continued)

(vii) Volunteers

The company regularly receives volunteer services as part of its operations. Volunteers assist the company on administrative tasks, with event management services (e.g. at our Gala ball) and with certain fundraising activities (e.g. grant applications). Under AASB 1058, private sector not-for-profit entities have a policy option to account for donated services at fair value if the fair value can be reliably measured. It has been decided to adopt the policy option not to recognise volunteer services. Accordingly, no amounts are recognised in the financial statements for volunteer services.

(viii) Interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

(d) Government grants

Grants from the government are recognised at their fair value where there is a reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and the company will comply with all attached conditions.

COVID-19 JobKeeper Subsidy

The COVID-19 JobKeeper Subsidy grant is recognised as other income when the employer is reasonably assured that it will comply with the conditions attached to it, and the grant will be received. The grant is recognised as a receivable when the associated wage payments are made. Receipt of reimbursement from the ATO reduced the receivable.

(e) Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as School for Life Foundation Australia Limited is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(f) Leases

Leases are recognised as a right-of-use asset and a corresponding liability at the date at which the leased asset is available for use by the company. The company has however elected to apply the recognition exemptions for short-term leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. The lease payments associated with these leases are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(g) Impairment of non-financial assets

Assets are tested for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use. For the purposes of assessing impairment, assets are grouped at the lowest levels for which there are separately identifiable cash inflows which are largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets (cash-generating units). Non-financial assets that suffered an impairment are reviewed for possible reversal of the impairment at the end of each reporting year.

(h) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of presentation in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

(i) Trade receivables

Trade receivables are amounts due in the ordinary course of business. They are generally due for settlement within 30 days and are therefore all classified as current. Trade receivables are recognised initially at the amount of consideration that is unconditional unless they contain significant financing components, when they are recognised at fair value. The company holds the trade receivables with the objective of collecting the contractual cash flows and therefore measures them subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

The company applies the AASB 9 *Financial Instruments* simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance for all trade receivables and contract assets.

To measure the expected credit losses, trade receivables and contract assets have been grouped based on shared credit risk characteristics and the days past due. The contract assets relate to unbilled work in progress and have substantially the same risk characteristics as the trade receivables for the same types of contracts. The company has therefore concluded that the expected loss rates for trade receivables are a reasonable approximation of the loss rates for the contract assets.

(j) Contract assets

A contract asset is the right to receive consideration in exchange for services rendered to the customer. Contract assets are recognised to the extent that services have been rendered but not yet invoiced and at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the company expects to be entitled in exchange for the services rendered. Contract assets are subject to impairment assessment.

(k) Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the company prior to the end of financial year which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition. Trade and other payables are presented as current liabilities unless payment is not due within 12 months from the reporting date. They are recognised initially at their fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

(I) Employee benefits

(i) Short-term obligations

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits that are expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service are recognised in respect of employees' services up to the end of the reporting period and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled. The liabilities are presented as current employee benefit obligations in the statement of financial position.

(ii) Other long-term employee benefit obligations

The liabilities for long service leave and annual leave are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service. They are therefore measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the end of the reporting period using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the end of the reporting period of corporate bonds with terms and currencies that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows. Remeasurements as a result of experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions are recognised in profit or loss.

(I) Employee benefits (continued)

(ii) Other long-term employee benefit obligations (continued)

The obligations are presented as current liabilities in the statement of financial position if the entity does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, regardless of when the actual settlement is expected to occur.

(iii) Post-employment obligations

The company pays contributions to publicly or privately administered defined contribution superannuation plans on a mandatory, contractual or voluntary basis. The company has no further payment obligations once the contributions have been paid. The contributions are recognised as employee benefit expense when they are due. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that a cash refund or a reduction in the future payments is available.

(m) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the taxation authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the taxation authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of accounting estimates which, by definition, will seldom equal the actual results. Management also needs to exercise judgement in applying the company's accounting policies.

(a) Significant estimates and judgements

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated. They are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that may have a financial impact on the entity and that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

(b) Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The company makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. There are no estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.
